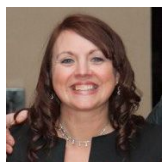
A Little Bit of Scottish History

There has been a lot of flooding across the United States this June. Can you imagine a flood of whiskey? Well, that very thing happened in Glasgow early in the morning of 21 November 1906.

The Loch Katrine (Adelphi) Distillery was situated in Muirhead Street in the Gorbals district of Glasgow. One of the distillery's washback vats collapsed resulting in a massive flood of over 150,000 gallons of hot whiskey. The torrent ran through the distillery yard and the neighboring street. There was only one fatality.
